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# HARWICH

A traditional historic maritime town, which was built on a grid pattern in the 13th Century by the Earl of Norfolk to exploit its strategic position at the mouth of the Stour/Orwell estuary.

The town of course is perhaps most well known for being the home of Christopher Jones, Captain of the Mayflower, who in 1620 took the first pilgrims to America. 2020 sees the 400th anniversary of this incredible journey and from now until then, Harwich will be participating in the many celebrations planned. Harwich beaches offer excellent views and are popular spots for walks and exploring.

There are also numerous attractions to visit in and around the town including the High and Low Lighthouses, the Treadwheel Crane, the Redoubt Fort (a truly spectacular Napoleonic circular fort and moat) and The Electric Palace Theatre, one of the UK's oldest operational cinemas.

One of the best ways to discover its history and all these attractions is to follow its 'Maritime Heritage Trail'. See map overleaf.

# **DOVERCOURT BAY**

Dovercourt Bay is a superb stretch of sandy beach and has a 'Blue Flag' Beach award. With a promenade that stretches for miles, walking, cycling and waterbased activities can be enjoyed. There are also spectacular views of Felixstowe as well as the Harwich and Languard Forts.

The town centre itself is home to a number of historic and character buildings which also reflects the towns' rich past, including being recorded in the Doomsday Book of 1086. The High Street is not dominated by chain retailers, rather a great selection of independent, family run businesses and shops which include specialist food, gift, crafts, clothing, florist and electrical goods. The town also hosts a regular market every Friday in the High Street.

# **OUT AND ABOUT**

## Walking

There are many great walks one can do which take in some fantastic history and picturesque countryside. Alternatively, take a stroll along Dovercourt Bay beach.

The Essex Way is a long distance footpath stretching for 82 miles right across Essex. Although it officially starts in Epping and ends in Harwich it is signposted both ways!


If you only wanted to do part of, a 16 mile walk will take you to Manningtree, where you can pick up a train to return you to Harwich. This route will take you cross country to the Stour estuary, with views across to Suffolk and then through to Wrabness. This will take you through Copperas Wood, a 12 hectare nature reserve that has been traditionally used for Sweet Chestnut and Hornbeam coppicing. You'll also pass Grayson Perry's innovative house known as 'A House for Essex', which is on Black Bouy Lane.

## Cycling

There are plenty of opportunities for cyclists to ride in and around both towns as well as from further afield. The local train service, operated by Greater Anglia, also welcomes cyclists, so whatever your route, experience or stamina, there is always the choice of going home by train!

Route 51 of The National Cycle Network is a long distance ride, suitable for the more energetic and adventurous cyclists and which passes through Oxfordshire, Buckinghamshire, Bedfordshire, Cambridgeshire, Suffolk and Essex, finishing in Harwich.

Part of the route is a 25 miles ride, which forms part of North Sea Cycle Route, starts in Colchester by the tourist information centre and heads to Wivenhoe along the River Colne. The route then proceeds to Harwich along country roads. The final off road stretch takes you through the town of Dovercourt before finishing by Harwich Pier.



### Beaches

If you like a peaceful seafront location with amazing sandy beaches, then head to the award winning Blue Flag beach at Dovercourt Bay. Harwich Beach offers excellent views and is a popular spot for walks and exploration.

## Activities

There are a wide range of family activities available along the promenade, including an impressive range of sport and leisure facilities, which can be found at Dovercourt Leisure Centre.

Dovercourt can boast its own Skating Rink, which is suitable for all ages and great fun for all. Skate hire is available and details of opening hours can be found on their web site. www.simplyskating.co.uk Tel: 01255 551296

Alternatively, Dovercourt skate park, which is situated alongside the leisure centre, is free and open all the year round.

If you fancy a go at windsurfing, paddle boarding or other water based activities, then head to the Quiver Windsurfing Centre in Dovercourt Bay. Tuition and the hire of windsurfers is available, as well as SUP, Kayak & Pedalos.

### Nature

The areas nature reserves and bird sanctuaries provide excellent opportunities for bird watchers and wildlife enthusiasts. Bobbit's Hole, Dovercourt, is a small freshwater lake bounded by secondary woodland and is a valuable wildlife pocket attracting a number of bird species, including the Kingfisher.

#### Harwich Maritime Trail

The ferry, which can accommodate up to 58 people on a brand new boat, takes foot passengers and cyclists from the H'Penny Pier across the Harbour to Shotley and Felixstowe.

#### The Guildhall

Church Street, Harwich

(Open 9.30am - 1.00pm Mon, Wed & Fri)

This is the towns only Grade I Listed Building and its present design dates from 1769 and remains the meeting place and administrative home of the Harwich Town Council. The Carvings Room was once used to hold prisoners waiting to be tried or sentenced and etched into the bare, wooden walls of the room are elaborate carvings of ships, gallows and symbols to ward off evil spirits, all of which date from the late 18th century. Guided tours are available by prior arrangement.

#### **Dovercourt Library**

A "community hub" is situated within the Library on Kingsway where you can take part in a host of activities such as workshops and see how the local community works together to celebrate its uniqueness. With the 400th anniversary coming up in 2020. When the Mayflower sailed with the Pilgrim Fathers to America, a replica ship is being built in Harwich. Next to Harwich Town Station, the beginnings of the ship can be seen. There is also an exhibition about the ships journey in the Visitor Centre at the Ha'penny Pier. # **GETTING THERE**

### **By Car**

**From the A12** / **A14**: Join the A120 at Colchester. Once on the A120 follow the signs to Harwich and Harwich International Port. On approaching Harwich, to visit Dovercourt, follow the signs to Dovercourt Town Centre and for Harwich, follow the brown tourism signs to 'Historic Harwich'.

**From the M11:** Leave at junction 8 and join the A120 eastwards, heading for Braintree and Colchester. Once at Colchester take the A12 towards Ipswich, but take the A120 signed to Harwich.

From the M25: At junction 28, take the A12 and then join the A120 at Colchester.

## **By Train**

Regular train services provide a fast, convenient service to both Harwich and Dovercourt on 'The Mayflower Line' from Colchester, Ipswich, Chelmsford and London Liverpool Street.

# **DID YOU KNOW?**

- Hi De Hi, the popular comedy series was filmed at Warner's Holiday Camp, Dovercourt between October 1979 and October 1987.
- Roy Francesco Salvadori, English motor racing driver and manager, was born in Dovercourt to parents of Italian descent and was living at 117 High Street from 1922-1929.
- Sir Thomas Lipton, Tea millionaire, owned a shop in Market Street.
- Dovercourt was recorded in the Doomsday Book and was a very small village with a population of about 120. The inhabitants were peasants who farmed the land around a cluster of wooden huts.
- As far as is known, Harwich has the only British example of a two-wheel man operated Treadwheel crane, which dates from 1667.
- The Pier Hotel on Harwich quay has been open since September 1860.
- In the 1660's, Samuel Pepys was First Secretary to the Admiralty and was also the town's MP.
- In the 1720s the writer Daniel Defoe visited Harwich and said it was 'a town of hurry and business, not much of gaiety and pleasure; yet the inhabitants seem warm in their nests and some of them are very rich'.
- Christopher Jones was born in Harwich in about 1570. Jones married Sarah Twitt in December 1593 and had one child. However Sarah died very young, he married again in St Nicholas Church in November 1603.
- Christopher Newport was born in Harwich and in 1607 he was overall captain of a small flotilla comprising three ships, the Discovery, the Godspeed and the Susan Constant, which dropped anchor in Chesapeake Bay near the mouth of the James River.
- The first 'Kindertransport' arrived in Harwich in 1938, bringing some 200 children from a Jewish orphanage in Berlin. Children with sponsors went to London but those without sponsors were housed in a summer camp in Dovercourt Bay.
- Captain Charles Fryatt, master of the SS Brussels and who was executed by the Germans in 1916 is buried in All Saints Church, Dovercourt. The Fryatt Memorial Hospital was named after him.
- German UBoats surrendered here after World War 1.
- The Headquarters of Trinity House is based here. They control all lighthouses and buoys around the country.

# POINTS OF INTEREST ON MAP

- A Queen Victoria Statue Life-size figure of Queen Victoria (1837-1901) formed in white carrara marble standing on a granite plinth, erected in 1904 in a prominent seafront position looking towards Dovercourt Town Centre.
- B Cliff Park Situated on the seafront and just a few minutes walk from Dovercourt Town Centre, the grounds contain mature trees and formal gardens, space to relax, a play area, bandstand, seating and great views out across Dovercourt Bay.
- **C** Mayor's Garden Restful public garden containing colourful floral beds during the summer, shrubs and trees.
- P Redoubt Fort A spectacular Napoleonic circular fort and moat built between 1808 and 1810 to protect the port of Harwich against the threat of invasion. It houses museums showing how the once derelict building was refurbished by volunteers, old artillery pieces and period exhibits through its life.
- High Lighthouse Built in 1818 by John Rennie to replace a light over the Town Gate. The High Lighthouse houses an exhibition on the history of the lighthouse. This and the Low Lighthouse (see P) provided a transit line to guide ships safely into Harwich harbour. Housing a radio museum it also marks the end of 'The Essex Way', an 82 mile walking route through the Essex countryside.
- **F Ha'penny Pier** A great vantage point to view the harbour and waterfront buildings. Its name originates from the ½d (half an old penny) toll charged when the pier opened in 1853 to accommodate continental ferries. The Harwich Society's seasonal Visitor Centre on the pier provides tourist information and houses an exhibition recording the voyages of Christopher Jones and Christopher Newport to the New World.
- **G** Lightship LV18 The last manned light ship in the UK, now moored permanently near Ha'penny Pier, as a Museum Ship, that welcomes visitors to tour the vessel and view its exhibits including Pirate Radio Station memorabilia.
- H Lifeboats The Harwich Lifeboat Station of the RNLI has two modern lifeboats which are a key rescue service for North Sea seafarers. Visitors are welcome to view the inshore boat housed in the building and the offshore lifeboat can be seen afloat on the waterfront.
- Navyard In former times this commercial dock was a Naval Yard. Numerous wooden warships were built on the site for the Royal Navy during the time of Samuel Pepys and Nelson. On the frontage you can view the original 1666 Dockyard Bell and the list of fighting ships built here.
- Street Murals Stroll along Wellington Street to view a colourful range of street murals on buildings and walls, including barges, ships, local features and seaside postcards.
- **Electric Palace Cinema** Built in 1911, it is one of the oldest operational cinemas in the UK, with a glorious front facade, traditional interior and great film programmes.
- **St Nicholas Church** The graceful Church built in 1822 is a good example of industrial architecture. Its simple neo-Gothic style incorporates slender iron columns, a wonderful organ and interesting monuments to seafarers. Designed to seat 1,500 people, the largest church in the district, it is often open to visitors.
- Mayflower Project Work is underway to construct a replica of the Mayflower – the ship that took the Pilgrim Fathers to America in 1620. It has a public viewing area. Nearby there is a plaque on the wall of 21 Kings Head Street, a private historic house, that was the former home of Christopher Jones, Master of the Mayflower (see U).
- N Life Boat Museum The attractive old Lifeboat station on the waterfront now houses the "Valentine Wyndham-Quin", an offshore lifeboat which was in service between 1968 -1984, and other exhibits.
- Treadwheel Crane A rare historic crane built in 1667, used at the Naval Yard, moved to its present site on Harwich Green in about 1932. The crane was worked by men walking in the interior of two large wheels to raise and lower goods and materials.
- **P** Low Lighthouse Museum Built in 1818 as the forward of two transit light houses (see also E), it now houses a maritime museum and is a great vantage point to view the harbour from the lantern.
- **Children's Play Grounds** Play equipment for youngsters situated in parks adjacent to the seafront promenade.
- R Leisure Centre & Swimming Pool The Dovercourt indoor heated swimming pool and new gym is open to the public throughout the year.
- **S** Leisure Activities The Dovercourt Low Road leisure area, adjacent to the beach and seafront promenade, provides a range of facilities including a boating lake, skate park, putting green and tennis courts.
- The Guildhall in a classical Georgian style, this Grade I Listed Building houses Harwich Town Council Chamber and a prison cell with ship carvings dating back to Napoleonic times
